



A WARNING TO CHRISTIANS ABOUT **SADHU SUNDAR SELVARAJ**

“Be on guard for yourselves and for all the flock, among which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to shepherd the church of God which He purchased with His own blood. I know that after my departure savage wolves will come in among you, not sparing the flock; and from among your own selves men will arise, speaking perverse things to draw away the disciples after them. Therefore, be on the alert...” (Acts 20:28–31)

Is Sundar Selvaraj merely an “Indian evangelist?” He calls himself a “prophet.” But what kind?

Selvaraj claims to meet personally—and often—with Jesus Christ, who gives him the divine (authoritatively true) interpretation of controversial and difficult Bible passages, warnings of future events, and more. **Selvaraj is thus claiming to be Jesus’ living mouthpiece to the entire world.** Selvaraj even claims he has had at least one personal audience with *God the Father* (allegedly on February 20, 2020).

But despite his frequent and intimate interactions, **Selvaraj is confused about the nature of God**, and has clearly taught in his magazine that He is only “one person” (the ancient anti-Trinitarian heresy of modalism).

In addition to countless angelic visitations (so frequent that he is “never fearful in the midst of angels”), **Selvaraj also claims to meet personally with various Old Testament prophets**—at least one of whom (Joel) actually *speaks through Selvaraj to us*. Selvaraj claims that dead Christians appear and speak to him.

Selvaraj has proclaimed on TV that [Jesus personally told him](#) that Roman Catholic Pope Francis is the “false prophet” of Revelation 13. **Remember: If Jesus is actually communicating the precise meaning of Scripture to Selvaraj, such messages are not only undeniably true, but universally binding on believers everywhere. Otherwise, if his numerous visions and direct encounters are mere delusions, Selvaraj is unfit for Christian ministry of any kind.**

Selvaraj is a false prophet—having falsely predicted in [October of 2020](#) that Donald Trump would be elected to a second term as President of the United States (“God’s Will is ‘Mr. Trump should *serve another term*’”). And this is only one example.

Selvaraj is also a sensationalist who plays on fear, acting recklessly and dangerously. For example:

- In [2013](#) he falsely prophesied that a “flesh-eating” disease would appear in Pangasinan, the Philippines—“a grievous disease [that] will spread all over the world. That will consume the flesh of men; all their upper (outer) skin will begin to decay. It will pierce through the bones. The fear of this disease will spread all over the world.” This hoax caused widespread panic.
- In [March of 2020](#) he warned that “Another worse than coronavirus is going to come. When that comes it will make this coronavirus look like child’s play” and “sting people like a hornet’s stinger,” raising body temperatures to more than 38° Celsius and causing boils all over the victim’s skin. Doctors and scientists, he said, “will be unable to discover how the virus works.”
- In [November of 2020](#) he warned believers everywhere “in the name of Jesus Christ” that coronavirus vaccines were “the mark of the Beast” (Revelation 13:18)—even producing special dramatized videos to frighten Indian Christians into refusing them.

The sacrifice of the Ugandan martyrs is a worthy topic. But why does Bishop Orombi appear alongside [a false prophet who promotes bizarre, unbiblical teachings on martyrs](#) to teach on this subject? For Orombi to share a pulpit with such a man gives credibility to a deceiver and brings confusion to the Body of Christ. This damages both Orombi’s credibility and that of the Church of Uganda. It’s as bad as appearing alongside Kakande or Owuor. In 1 Thessalonians 5:19–22 we are commanded to [test all revelatory claims by Scripture](#)—and to “avoid every appearance of evil.” By the examples listed above and more, **Selvaraj fulfills the Bible’s warnings about false prophets and teachers** (e.g., Colossians 2:18–19; Romans 6:17–18; 2 Corinthians 11:13–15; 2 Peter 2:1–3, 3:14–18; 1 Timothy 1:3–7; 2 Timothy 4:1–5; Titus 1:16, 2:1).
